Ending Sentences with Prepositions

Rewrite the following sentences on another sheet for homework. These will require a lot of thought and time.

- Remember the “which” rule - think of “which” and how you can use it in a sentence for correct placement of a preposition.
- Remember that prepositions BEFORE the end of a sentence can remain where they are.
- Sometimes you don’t need “which” but you can change the verb or subject to correct.
- Also remember that not always do you need to change a sentence. If the meaning is dramatically altered or more commonly, a sentence ends in a helping verb, not a preposition, you do not need to edit.
 - In this case, the following sentences are grammatically incorrect and need your corrections.

1. Where is my thumb drive at?
2. What do you need to Walmart for?
3. Which classroom is he in?
4. She's the person I want to get away from.
5. This is a rule we agree with.
6. That is something you can live with.
7. Who did you give the report to?
8. After that big meal, what more could I ask for?
9. The dog got shouted at and spat on.
10. You speak to Pete since I find him so difficult to speak to.
